Health Insurance

The Louisiana Department of Insurance is closely monitoring the spread of COVID-19 (coronavirus) and working with health plans across the state to ensure access and care for all Louisiana residents.

Health plans in Louisiana are taking critical steps to:

- Consumers with fully-insured individual and group health plans will not be charged co-payments, co-insurance, or deductibles related to COVID-19 laboratory testing administered consistent with guidelines issued by the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
- Health plans will take action to ease network, referral, and prior authorization requirements and/or waive patient cost sharing.



- Plans will also take action so that patients will have continuous access to their regular prescription medications.
- Health plans are sharing information with clinicians, mobilizing network providers, and coordinating care
 management programs to ensure providers have the best available data to identify, diagnose, and treat
 infections.

Outside of these instances, regular terms of insurance such as co-payments, co-insurance, and deductibles will still apply.
